## ROCKY MOUNTAIN SOCIETY OF PHOTOGRAMMETRY

Geological Survey, Corps of Engineers, University of Colorado, Colorado Water Conservation Board, and several private engineering companies whose names, unfortunately, I do not remember. No one of us can know all there is to know about photogrammetry, and therefore, the more we get together, pool our information and exchange ideas, the better off the science of photogrammetry will be. Much good can come from an organization such as the Rocky Mountain Society of Photogrammetry.

After the business part of the meeting, I endeavored to describe some of the photogrammetric methods and equipment used in this country.
