
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DISCUSSION

Chairman McNair: The general conduct of the panel discussion this afternoon will be the presentation of six papers, with particular emphasis on the matters with which the speaker is most familiar. At the conclusion of those somewhat formal presentations, I expect to have questions from the audience and discussion.

You probably are much interested in where we now stand in the matter of education in photogrammetry here in the United States. Unfortunately, the survey has been made only for the civil engineering schools, but I believe Professor Brinker will be able to give us some insight into the situation there.

Professor Brinker is the Chairman of Committee Eight of the American Society for Engineering Education. This is the Surveying and Mapping Commit-



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tee of the Civil Engineering Division of that Society. He has had considerable experience at various schools, teaching at the University of Hawaii, Southern California, and Minnesota, He is now in the Civil Engineering Department of Virginia Polytechnic Institute.
