# The Honorary Membership Award 1989 Recipients: Chester E. Kowalczyk and Harry

E. Tubis

Colonel Frederick O. Diercks, a recipient of the award last year, presented the awards and the following citations:

#### Citation for Harry E. Tubis

Harry Tubis, an Emeritus Member of ASPRS is one of the dwindling number of living Charter Members of the American Society of Photogrammetry, having participated in the creation of the Society at Wright Field in 1934. He was educated in Civil Engineering at Drexel Institute of Technology (now Drexel University) in Philadelphia and was first employed by Brock and Weymouth, Inc. of that city in 1927-31. From 1931-32 he was a member of Aerotopograph Corporation of America in Washington, DC, and in 1933 he joined the Tennessee Valley Authority in Knoxville where, under George Whitmore's Maps and Surveys Division, he organized and directed the operations of

the Aerial Mapping Section until 1937.

From 1937 to 1938 Harry worked for the Agricultural Adjustment Administration in Washington where he organized and directed AAA work for a seven-state aerial photography program. In 1940 he was manager of plant operations and sales for Standard Aerial Surveys, and in 1946 he became vice president of Robinson Aerial Surveys. In 1947 Harry was a founding partner of Harry Tubis, Inc., an aerial surveying firm in Newark, New Jersey, which functioned until 1958. That same year Harry joined RCA Corporation of America in Morristown, New Jersey as a member of the Siting Team and Resident Engineer for defense-related Early Warning and Intelligence Gathering Systems for the Armed Services, where he had extended assignments in the Arctic and other overseas areas until 1972.

Since his retirement in 1972, Mr. Tubis has researched. written, and prepared Archives related to aerial photography and mapping, with contributions to the Smithsonian

Institution, the Franklin Institute, the DuPont Museum, and to ASPRS, where he assisted in establishing the Heinz Gruner Library and served as Assistant Editor for the Society's 50th Anniversary publications and memorabilia. Active on many Society committees and working groups since its inception in 1934, Mr. Tubis was a founder and charter member of the New York Metropolitan section of ASP and has worked behind the scenes at many ASP-ACSM conventions. He was a Director of ASP from 1938-1940 and vice president in 1956.

From 1948 to 1954 he was an instructor in photogrammetry at the Cooper Union Institute in New York, and in 1953 he co-authored the 'Photogrammetry Lab Kit' for instruction in aerial mapping fundamentals. He has published the Kit continuously since, with many college adoptions, and sales to Defense agencies and professional


Harry Tubis represents the finest professional and personal qualities of the old-time photogrammetrist and is a worthy recipient of ASPRS's Honorary Member Award.

#### Citation for Chester E. Kowalczyk

Chester E. Kowalczyk has been in the photogrammetric profession since 1935, when he was first employed with the Northeast Division, Engineering Unit of the Agricultural Adjustment Administration of the USDA. In 1940, he joined the US Navy Hydrographic Office, where he remained until his retirement in May 1971, as NAVOCEANO's Senior Line Manager. As director of the 78-man staff of the Photogrammetry Division of the Technical Production Department, he was directly responsible for managing NAVOCEANO's application of the art and science of photogrammetry to the production and improvement of navigational and special-purpose charts and publications essential to US Fleet and Merchant Marine operations.

A native of Philadelphia, Mr. Kowalczyk studied chemical engineering at Villanova University and the Drexel Institute and civil engineering at George Washington University, with other studies in Advanced Map Making at GWU, and Space Research and Technology at the University of Maryland.


